I've been watering much more than usual for April and have had to hold back from hardening-off those plants which look like they want to go out a month earlier than usual. I have had to be careful not to scorch seedlings in the greenhouse and ensure that when they are pricked out, they have a shady corner to recover for a day before being subjected to any direct sunlight.

No doubt, a selection of the photos will feature in our main 2020 Newsletter later in the year.

Early April

1. There may be a frost over the next few nights, so protect seedlings and tender plants overnight - your car makes a good greenhouse!

2. We have had no rain since lockdown - water your garden

3. Squires still has compost - email them

Mid April

1. It is still only April - Beware we could have a frost. BUT, I have planted my tomatoes outside.

2. Beware the box caterpillar is on the move. Inspect your Box plants and if you see the dreaded black and yellow stripe, spray with Ultra Bug.

3. More vegetables on the way, things change daily.

End of April

1. There is no rain due until Monday, keep your plants watered especially newly planted ones.

2. Keep an eye on your roses some have rust and black spot. Spray with an antifungal solution. IF you cannot get hold of this try this, it may work. 6 tablets of aspirin crushed and 1 teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda dissolved in 1 litre of water, spray thoroughly. (NB this seems to be working, I have a rose which suffers from rust very badly and it has not got any worse)

3.Cut the dead heads off your daffodils, but keep the leaves until mid May, after that you can cut them back and clear them away.
