#### **Surrey Dispersed Collection Project**

Our National Plant Collections are at the heart of our activities at Plant Heritage. When these collections are held privately the responsibility to care for these collections often falls on the shoulders of just one person. Having a dispersed collection brings with it a number of benefits : -

- 1) The responsibility is shared between the participating members.
- 2) Having multiple locations involved means that we can keep 'backup' plants. Having duplicates of each plant in at least two locations to reduce any concerns or risks to the collection if one plant fails.
- 3) Reducing the problems associated with keeping a mono-culture. The risk of serious loss from pests and disease increases the more plants of one genus that are kept together. If we all keep just a few plants in different locations then the chance that the collection could be seriously impacted by pests and disease are considerably reduced.
- 4) We can all directly help and participate in Plant Heritage's aims of helping to conserve our garden plants.
- 5) It's going to be fun!

We announced our intention to start this project at our AGM in February. Unfortunately the current global health crisis has made meetings to get this project off the ground impossible. However, now the group has purchased a Zoom account we do have the opportunity of coming together to discuss how to proceed and more excitingly what collection we would like to start. Whatever we choose, it will be an easy plant which most, if not all of us, will have a suitable location to grow.



We will not only need people to grow the collection but also people to help with the administration and co-ordination. In addition, we will also require good natured folk to cheer us on! So please do not feel that you are undertaking an onerous horticultural commitment by joining this project.
